## UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

## NOTICE TO CITIZENS.

Under an ordinance passed by the Common Council, the owners of all cattle, horses and swine are liable to a heavy tax and costs for the driving and impounding of such animals found running at large in the streets of the city.

The yeas and nays being called on the adoption of the substitute, Ald. Frost, 10th, voted in the negative.

Ald. Gies contended the substitute as laid over under the rules.

The chair decided against Ald. Gies.

Ald. Gies appealed from the decision of the chair. The question being put, "Shall the decision of the chair be sustained," the same was sustained by the following vote:
