RESOLUTION.

Resolution to open and extend North street, from its present westerly terminus till it reaches and unites with the easterly line of Russell street.

Be it Resolved by the Common Council of the City of Detroit, State of Michigan, that it is necessary to make the following public improvement in said city, to wit: To open and extend North street, in the Sixth Ward of said city, from its present westerly terminus till it reaches and unites with the easterly line of Russell street.

And the said Common Council do hereby declare that they intend to take and use, for the purpose of making said improvement, the following property, viz.: All that part of the Gouin farm, bounded and described as follows, commencing at the southwest corner of lot 40, subdivision of the Riopelle farm, north of the Gratiot Road, running thence south 64° west 306 60-100 feet, thence south 26° east 50 feet, thence north 64° east 306 60-100 feet, thence north 26° west 50 feet to the place of beginning.

And the said Common Council do further declare that they will, on the first Monday in May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hun-

dred and sixty-seven, at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon of that day, apply to the Recorder's Court of said city, at the court-room of said court, in said city, for the drawing and empanneling of a jury to ascertain the necessity for using the property above described, as intended to be taken and used for the purpose of making said improvement, and to ascertain the just damages and compensation to which any person may be entitled if said improvement be made.

And the City Clerk of said city is hereby directed to cause this resolution to be published for four (4) successive weeks before said first Monday of May, A. D. 1867, in THE DETROIT DAILY FREE PRESS, the official daily newspaper of said city, and the Detroit Daily Union, another daily newspaper published in said city.

And the Superintendent of Police of said city is hereby directed, by himself or by one of the captains or sergeants of police under his direction, to serve notices of this resolution on the persons and in the manner prescribed in section three of chapter seven of the charter of said city.
