To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen-Relative to the resolu-on of your honorable body passed tion of your honorable body passed Dec. 8, instructing this department to remove five poplar trees in front of 102 St. Paul avenue, I have to say that our forester has investigated the mat-ter and reports that there are ten trees planted from twelve to fourteen feet apart; that he does not consider these trees dangerous, as they have all re-cently been topped; that he could deno place where the roots have raised the sidewalk and that they are all several feet from the buildings. There is one old decayed maple on the corner and this will be removed. The removal of five of the ten trees would better conditions but little.

In view of this report of the condi-tions as found by the forester we feel that the provisions of the ordinance and the opinion of the Corporation Counsel should apply. This latter opinion, which was rendered by Mr. P. J. M. Hally when Corporation Counsel, reads as follows:

"There is no obligation on the part of the Department of Parks and Boulevards to remove trees in the highway that are not dangerous or dead trees.

If abutting property owner desires to build a sidewalk or to extend his sidewalk for his own convenience or to meet the obligations imposed by the ordinance as to the width of the sidewalk upon a portionary street and the walk upon a particular street, and the presence of trees would hinder or prevent the building of the sidewalk, without their removal, the cost of residewalk, moval is a part of the expense incident to the building of the sidewalk which the property owner must bear.
