To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—Acting upon the request from your Honorable Body, under date of October 5, 1920, that the City Plan Commission make an investigation as to the advisability of acquiring property for playground purposes in the vicinity of Garfield and Russell streets, this Commission recommends the following for consideration, which has been concurred in by the Recreation Commission.

Inasmuch as there is a very heavy density of child population in this vicinity, it is recommended that lots 2 to 7 on Garfield avenue, between

Russell and Riopelle streets, one-hundred and ninety by one hundred feet (190'x100') be condemned for playground purposes. All of the above as outlined in yellow on attached blue-print, Plan No. 209.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen: Acting upon a communication from the Harper Avenue Improvement Association, for the opening of Miller avenue, the City Plan Commission recommends the following for your consideration:

That Curt avenue (extension of Miller avenue) be opened through its unopened portions between Van Dyke and Iroquois avenues, to a width of fifty feet (50'); that Pressler be opened through its unopened portions between Van Dyke and Maxwell avenues, to a width of fifty feet (50'); that Peter Hunt be opened through its unopened portions between Burns and Seneca avenues to a width of fifty feet (50'); that Erwin avenue be widened to fifty feet (50') between Georgia and Bessemore avenues; that the alley north of and parallel to Curt avenue, between Van Dyke and Maxwell avenues, be opened to its existing width through its unopened portions, and that the alley north of and parallel to Pressler avenue, between Van Dyke and Maxwell avenues, be opened to its existing width through its unopened portions. All of the above as outlined in yellow on attached blueprint, Plan No. 200.

These are all short openings, but will provide for better fire protection in that locality.
