To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—A meeting of the Detroit City Sinking Fund Commission was held in the Council Chamber at twelve o'clock, noon, June 9th, 1920, the following commissioners being present: Couzens, Steffens, Lodge, Vernor, Simons, Bradley, Littlefield, Kronk, Nagel, Williams, acting for Commissioner Ingalls.

The following resolution introduced by Commissioner Steffens was unanimously adopted:

From the Detroit House of Correction.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—Please be advised that J. O. Stutsman has been appointed Superintendent of the Detroit House of Correction to assume active duties July 1, 1920.

Mr. Stutsman is now engaged in a study of local conditions, familiarizing himself with the activities of the Courts, Police Department, Welfare Commission, and other agencies interested in the problems incidental to the actual conduct of the affairs of the House of Correction.

For your information, may we add that Mr. Stutsman was for four years secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Association of Maryland, stimulating humane, reformatory treatment of prisoners of that State, providing congenial environment and remunerative employment for discharged prisoners and recommending parole for worthy men, in which capacity he inspected all the jails, house of correction, penitentiary, juvenile institutions, and other penal and correctional institutions of Maryland. For three years he acted as Parole Officer and Court Representative, District Superintendent, and Superintendent of the Research Bureau of Kansas City, and later for five years was Superintendent of the Kansas City Prison Farm.
