Gentlemen—The Public Welfare Commission respectfully requests permission to employ three Resident Physicians, for eight hour service each, in the Admitting and Emergency Department of the Receiving Hospital, at a salary of \$3,000.00 per annum instead of two physicians at \$6,000.00 per annum as previously requested on December 5th, 1922.

This arrangement will afford the hospital the services of licensed medical men who will be on duty day and night, thereby giving this

branch of the service their entire attention upon the admission and discharge of every patient.

Therefore, we would respectfully ask that your Honorable Body appropriate the sum of \$4,125.00 for this purpose from Jan. 15th to June 30th, 1923, and direct the City Controller to place same to the credit of Activity 10-B Salaries and Maintenance.
