Resolved, that this body, having completed its consideration of the Budget of the City of Detroit for the year 1940-1941, as contemplated by Chapter 1, Title VI, of the Charter of the City of Detroit, does hereby determine the amounts of money to be raised by taxation for the purposes of the several funds constituted by said Charter, and be it further

Resolved, that this body by a majority vote of all members elected thereto, adopts said Budget, and transmits same to the City Clerk for submission to His Honor, the Mayor, in accordance with Section 5, Chapter 1, Title VI of the City Charter.

By Councilman Sweeney:

Resolved, That the City Controller be and he is hereby authorized and requested to survey the rate of wages prevailing in private employment for all trades and classifications under the Prevailing Rate scale in the official salary schedules and report prior to July 1, 1940, any adjustments or recommendations in rates now paid or incorporated in the 1940-1941 budget for City employes: and further Resolved, That this Body hereby reserve the right to make the following changes in the detailed positions in the 1940-1941 budget:

- (1) To make changes in Prevailing Rates.
- (2) To increase positions to the minimum induction rates.
- (3) To make salary and wage increases or reductions in accordance with classification, salary and wage survey findings.
- (4) To make scheduled salary and/or wage increases in accordance with the salary schedule from funds provided in the 1940-1941 budget for this purpose.
- (5) To make salary and wage adjustments to compensate employees for any changes in costs or charges for meals, maintenance, rooms or quarters.

Resolved, that the Welfare Commission be requested that in determining allowances for food in the individual budgets of welfare relief clients that such allowances be not less than the minimum food budget as recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture, Home Economics Bureau, and be it further

Resolved, that such food allowances be adjusted from time to time in accordance with the revised minimum budget recommendations released by the United States Department of Agriculture, Home Economics Bureau, and be it further

Resolved, that the Welfare Commission be requested to make every effort to provide at the earliest possible moment proper provisions for medical treatment which will incorporate the best possible treatment with the least inconvenience and suffering to sick clients, and be it further
