Gentlemen - The Department of Parks and Recreation has requested that the City Plan Commission investigate the possibility of changing the street and alley pattern east of Molena and south of Castle Avenue.

In order to facilitate the development of the recreation site, the Department of Parks and Recreation has offered the land to make the necessary changes in the street and allev pattern. A 40 x 60 ft. turn-around is to be provided at the dead-end of Molena Avenue. An 18 ft. strip of land to provide an alley outlet at the west end of the site. Also, a strip of land to widen the alleys at the north side of the recreation cite. Honorable Common Council:

Gentlemen—This office has before it several matters relating to the assignment of space in the old City Hall. These matters are as follows: 1. The provision of space in the

- basement to house the recruiting activities of the four branches of the Armed Services.
- 2. The housing of the Farwell Art Collection.
- 3. The housing of the Natural Science Museum Collection.
- 4. The proposal for establishing a non-sectarian meditation chapel.

These four matters will be dis-

cussed in order.

1. Military Recruiting
The Air Force initiated this request because their activities had outgrown the booth on Campus Martius which they share with the Army and Navy.

The City Plan Commission has for some time felt that it would be de-sirable to improve Campus Martius by the elimination of both the glass booth used by the Army, Navy and Air Force and the old brick information booth used by the Army, Navy and Air Force and the old brick information in item (2) tion booth now used by the Marine above, it would then be possible for

Corps for recruiting. The clearing of Campus Martius of these structures would permit its attractive landscaping which would be in line with the city's desire to improve and beautify the Central Business District.

The Armed Services, on the other hand, are anxious to continue recruiting activities in the Campus Martius area which is, in a sense, the crossroads of the city. They feel strongly that they could not adequately perform their function if they were forced to withdraw to the Federal Building.

All four branches of the Armed Services have indicated their willingness to accept space in the northerly end of the basement of the City Hall. This space is now occupied for Civil Service recruiting which has in turn indicated a willingness to accept space in the southeast corner of the basement.

In view of the above, it is recommended that (a) military recruiting for the four branches be permitted to use space in the north end of the basement, (b) the Civil Service recruiting be moved to the south end of the basement, (c) that the two structures on Campus Martius be vacated and removed, and (d) that the Department of Parks and Recreation and this office be directed to develop an improvement plan for the triangular island in Campus Martius.

2. Farwell Art Collection
The Farwell Art Collection is a city-owned collection of paintings of historical interest under the juris-diction of the Detroit and Michigan Artists Memorial, Inc. The collection includes paintings either by Detroit or Michigan artists or of Detroit or Michigan subjects.

The City Plan Commission has felt that it would be appropriate for the old City Hall to be used for activities of general educational and ceremonial nature as well as for certain office activities. The housing of the Far-well Art Collection would be consistent with this view.

It is therefore recommended that the southerly half of the second floor, which is now vacant, be assigned to the Detroit and Michigan Artists Memorial, Inc.

Certain minor refurbishing of the space should be done such as repainting throughout and repairing the floor. These items can be done the under the present maintenance budget for the building. It would be under desirable to have a doorway installed across the corridor at the northerly end of the space so that the area could be controlled, and it would also be desirable to install an asphalt tile floor throughout the space. These items would require an additional ap-
