The following is the ordinance: An Ordinance to amend section 2 of chapter 80 of the Revised Ordinances of 1884.

It is hereby ordained by the People of the city of Detroit

SEC. 1. That section 2 of chapter 80 of the Revised Ordinances of 1884 be and is hereby

amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 2. All drays, carts, express and furniture wagons and other vehicles used for the transportation of baggage, goods, merchandise and other wares, plying for hire within the limits of the city, shall, while waiting for employment, occupy the following stands, and no others, that is to say:
Drays and furniture wagons to stand on Monroe
avenue, from a point 20 feet south of the crosswalk, extending from Hull's corner to the Williams block, so called, to the crosswalk between Michigan Grand avenue and Woodward avenue, and west of the railway track on said avenue; also on Monroe avenue, from a point 60 feet south of the crosswalk, extending from Hull's corner to the Williams block so called, to the crosswalk extending from Michigan Grand ave-

nue to Woodward avenue and erst of the railway nue to Woodward avenue and erst of the railway track, also on Monroe avenue between Farmer and Farrar streets, and between Farrar and Randolph streets, west of the railroad track; also on Randolph street from Gratiot avenue to a point 50 feet north of the intersection of Monroe avenue; also drays and express wagons to; stand on Randolph street between Jefferson avenue and Larned street, near the west curb line of said street; also on the center of Griswold ettreet between Jefferson avenue and Larned line of said street; also on the center of Griswold street, between Jefferson avenue and Larned street and near the west curb line between Michigan avenue and State street; also on Michigan avenue, between Griswold and Rowland streets, north of the railway track; also on Jefferson avenue, between Griswold and Shelby streets and between Shelby and Wayne streets, south of the railway track; also on the corner of Woodward avenue, between Jefferson avenue Woodward avenue, between Jefferson avenue and Woodbridge street, and between Woodbridge and Atwater streets; also near the west curb line on Brush street, between Jefferson avenue and Woodbridge street, and between Woodbridge street, and between Woodbridge street and a point 40 feet northerly of Atwater street; also near the north curb line of Front street, between First and Second streets, and between Second and Third streets, also along the center of Woodbridge street from a point 250 feet west of Third street, for a distance of 150 feet avecating the interest. for a distance of 150 feet, excepting the intersec-tion of Fourth street; and drays and four-wheeled trucks only on Larned street between Bates and Randolph streets and on Bates street near the east curb line between Larned and Congress streets.

Provided, That this section shall not be construed to permit any of the above mentioned vehicles to stand within ten feet of any crossstreet or crosswalk, and provided further, that in all the streets and avenues named wherein street-railway tracks are laid, vehicles shall stand in a line parallel with said railway, and at a distance of two feet therefrom, and at the side thereof designated in this ordinance; and, pro-vided further, that the privileges herein granted shall be subject to the rights of owners or occupants of property adjacent to said streets and

SEC 2. This ordinance shall take immediate effect.
