79 For the use of hotels and res-
80 taurants where an extraordinary
81 amount of garbage must be taken
82 care of, the Board of Health shall
83 have the power to direct the use
84 of sanitary receptacles.

85 Sec. 6. Any person failing or
86 neglecting to comply with the re-
87 quirements of this ordinance or vio-
88 lating any of the provisions there-
89 of, or any person or persons found
90 guilty of stealing, damaging, mutil-
91 ating or in any way interfering
92 with garbage or rubbish recepta-
93 cles whether in public alleys or
94 upon private property, shall be sub-
95 ject to prosecution in the Record-
96 er's Court and upon conviction shall
97 be subject to punishment by fine not
98 exceeding \$25 or by imprisonment
99 in the Detroit House of Correction
100 for a period not exceeding ten (10)
101 days.

2 Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take
3 effect July 1, 1912; and the Com-
4 missioner of Police shall cause to
5 be served upon every householder
6 within the limits of said city, a
7 copy of this Ordinance.

House of Correction.

To the Honorable the Common Council:
Gentlemen—Your Committee on House
of Correction, to whom was referred the
50th annual report of the Board of In-
spectors of the House of Correction, em-
bodying the report of the Superintendent
of said institution for the year ending
December 31, 1911, beg leave to state
that your committee attended the an-
nual meeting of the board held at the
House of Correction on Feb. 29th and
are unanimous in expressing our opin-
ion that the Superintendent as well as
the Board of Inspectors of said institu-
tion are entitled to much praise and
commendation upon the showing made
during the past year, even though the
actual amount of cash turned over to the
city is less than that paid in former
years, which is accounted for by reason
of the fact that the compensation to
prisoners has been doubled and an addi-
tional appropriation of \$5,000 of the
earnings of said institution was set
aside for the care of dependents, under
direction of the Poor Commission. Your
committee, together with the Chief Ac-
countant, have examined the various ac-
counts and vouchers and find them to be
correct, as are also the contracts en-
tered into with the various counties. We
therefore recommend that the report as
submitted be adopted and referred back
to the Superintendent for printing, also
that a vote of thanks be extended to the
Superintendent and the Board of In-
spectors and we herewith offer the fol-
lowing resolution.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 147
of the Compiled Ordinances of the
City of Detroit for the year 1904, by
adding two new sections thereto to be
known as sections 7 (a) and
7 (b).

It is hereby ordained by the People
of the City of Detroit:

Section 1. That Chapter 147 of
the Compiled Ordinances of the
City of Detroit for the year 1904
be and the same is hereby amended
by adding two new sections there-
to to be known as sections 7 (a)
and 7 (b), which shall read as fol-
lows:

Sec. 7 (a). No explosives, other
than dynamite and powder shall
be transported by wagon through
the streets, avenues, alleys and
public lanes of the City of Detroit
unless said wagon in which same
is to be transported is in charge of
a competent person holding a cer-
