We further find that the proposed ordinance if adopted would tend toordinance if adopted would tend toward the establishment of a monopoly in installation work and would be contrary to the great manufacturing interest of our city as well as an unnecessary hardship upon the small householders, and for these among other reasons, we therefore recommend that said ordinance, presented by Ald. Lodge on Sept. 22, 1914, (J. C. C. p. 1469-74), be indefinitely postponed.
