Street Openings.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:
Gentlemen—Your Committee on Street
Openings has had before it the petition
of Newton Beef Company in which is
prayed "the closing of the westerly end
of Putnam Avenue, from the line of
rourteenth Avenue to the north and
south alley, including north end of alley,"
and on investigation find:
The land which lies north of Warren.

and on investigation find:
The land which lies north of Warren, south of the railroad, east of Fifteenth and west of Fourteenth, was so platted that a 20 foot alley extended northerly from Warren to the railroad midway between Fourteenth and Fifteenth, with Putnam avenue extending westerly 70 feet wide from Fourteenth Avenue to this north and south alley. From the north line of Putnam Avenue to the south line of the railroad the alley does not exist other than on paper. At the westerly end of Putnam Avenue the owners of the property which faces Fifteenth Street, have extended garages of Putnam Avenue.

The petitioner owns all of the property on the west side of Fourteenth Avenue from the railroad south to the north line of Putnam Avenue, and owns also the lot which is on the southwest corner of Fourteenth and Putnam.

Putnam Avenue serves to give access to and from Fourteenth Avenue by those using the north and south alley as it now exists between Warren and Put-

There is no even remote possibility of There is no even remote possibility of Putnam Avenue ever being opened westerly from its present ending. That it is of little use is obvious from the fact that it is unpaved, and that upon the south side no sidewalk has ever been laid. The owners of the property which faces Fifteenth Street use it for storage and have, as above suggested, by building garages easterly from their lot line, indicated their willingness to have the public excluded from it. It serves no purposes incident to the alley which was originally dedicated northerly from purposes incident to the alley which was originally dedicated northerly from it, because that portion of the alley no longer exists.

The petitioner proposes to give those using the north and south alley ingress and egress to and from Fourteenth Avenue by the dedication of a 20 foot alley on the southerly side of the lot at the southwest corner of Putnam and Fourteenth teenth.

It need not be pointed out that the petitioner by having a 70 foot street vacated in lieu of a dedication by it of a 20 foot alley will gain what to it is valuable property; yet, by the vacation, the City loses nothing which is of use to it, and on the other hand it gets the advantage of having 50 feet of Fourteenth Avenue frontage with the buildings which the petitioner contemplates ings which the petitioner contemplates to erect thereon put upon the tax roll, and rids itself of any liability which may

and rids itself of any liability which may grow out of its failure to keep this dead end of Putnam Avenue reasonably safe and fit for travel.

We think the prayer of the petitioner should be granted, conditioned on repayment to the City of whatever amount has been by the City expended in possing payment to the City of whatever amount has been by the City expended in paving Fourteenth Avenue past the Putnam Avenue frontage involved, in laying crosswalks, and in laying whatever sewer may extend northerly across the westerly end of the street.

We think also that the petitioner should be required to obtain the consent of the owners of the lot which will

be situated immediately south of the con-

be situated filling the contemplated alley.

This being done, we recommend that the prayer of the petitioner be granted, and herewith submit appropriate resolu-
