Vacation of Alley.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—To your Committee of the Whole was referred the petition of Rev. M. Somobo et al. (8362), for the vacation of 10-foot public alley adjoining lot 181, southeast corner of Riopelle and Maple streets, being alley first east of and parallel to Riopelle street, extending from Maple street to alley north of and parallel to Sherman street. Your Committee finds that petitioner is the owner of above lot 181, and in consideration of said vacation, will deed to the city for alley purposes, sufficient land to open existing 20-foot alley in said block into Riopelle street, said new alley to be 10 feet wide for a distance of 42 feet and 20 feet wide for a distance of 16 feet. After an investigation of the matter, your committee recommends that the petition be granted, provided above described land is deeded to the city for alley purposes, and offer the following resolution.
