

tween the said Seller and Purchaser that the title to said sump house and sump well shall be and remain the property of said Seller and that said Seller shall have the right to remove the same whenever they desire to do so. And it is also understood that Seller, upon vacating the premises, is under no obligation to fill up the sump well or otherwise repair and improve the said property.

And it is further mutually understood and agreed between said Seller and Purchaser that there is a County drain in front of said property and that the Seller shall be under no obligation to re-locate or cover such drain and as it is now located in that part of the street where the sidewalk and water line should be installed, the Seller shall not be required to install said sidewalk or said waterline in accordance with the terms of said land contract until said drain has been re-located or covered by the proper public authorities or otherwise.

By Councilman Stevenson:

Resolved, That Eleventh street, a strip of land on the Lognon Farm Private Claim Twenty-seven (27), fifty (50) feet wide, immediately west of and adjoining the westerly line of the Woodbridge Farm from the southerly line of Fort street west to the northerly line of Jefferson avenue west, formerly River road, be and the same is hereby vacated to become a part and parcel of the adjoining property; reserving to the City of Detroit the right to maintain, renew, repair and use a public sewer or sewers as long as may be deemed necessary by the city in that part of said vacated Eleventh street and within the limits thereof, described as follows:

A seven (7) foot cylindrical two ring brick sewer, the bottom of said sewer having an elevation of 93.99 City Datum at its intersection with the southerly line of Fort street and whose center line is described as follows:

Beginning a point in the southerly line of Fort street—four hundred seventeen (417) feet westerly measured along said southerly line from its intersection with the westerly line of Tenth street; thence southerly, one hundred and four (104) feet to a point thirteen (13) feet easterly at right angles from the westerly line of Eleventh street; said point being the point of beginning of two four (4) feet by five (5) feet six (6) inch sewers; thence on a continuation of the last described course, sixty two (62) feet; thence southeasterly at an angle of thirty (30) degrees twenty-five (25) feet to the intersection of the center line of the two existing five (5) foot cylindrical sewers; the elevation of the bottom of the sewer at this point being 93.79 City Datum; thence southerly at an angle of thirty-two (32) degrees along the center line of the two existing five (5) foot cylindrical sewers one hundred fifty-eight (158) feet more or less to the northerly line of Jeffer-



son avenue west, the bottom of said sewer having an elevation of 93.50 City Datum at this point.

Resolved, That the City Controller be and is hereby directed to execute a quit claim deed to The Michigan Central Railroad Company covering the property herein vacated.
