By Councilman Bradley:

Tracy W. McGregor, civic leader, philanthropist and Christian gentleman, died Wednesday, May 6th, in Washington, D. C., at the age of sixty-seven. From early manhood, Mr. McGregor devoted his talents and his energies to the task of improving the condition of unfortunate men and women in Detroit.

He was born at Oberlin Heights, Ohio, and when but twenty-two years of age discontinued his studies at Oberlin College to assume the responsibilities of his deceased father, Thomas McGregor, founder of McGregor Mission. Mr. Tracy McGregor had the heart of a woman, but the judgment of a well seasoned man of affairs. He might be termed a practical idealist. Tens of thousands of destitute and discouraged men came under the influence of his inspiring personality and many of them, now in Detroit or scattered throughout
