Mayor's Capital Improvement Program Committee

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen—The original Advance Plan Program contains a number of projects which had been reported by the Department of Street Railways as being suitable for advance preparation of plans and specifications. Recently the Department has furnished this Committee with a revised schedule of advance plan projects which does not include a number of items originally scheduled.

These projects are listed as follows:

Elevated Coach Storage.....	\$900,000
Salt Storage Plants.....	60,000
Carpenter Shop and Storage....	62,000
Second Story for Line and Track Building	26,000
Cashier's Offices	24,500
Addition to Coolidge Office.....	10,000
Addition to Administration Building	56,000
Hastings Emergency Station....	25,000

The present policy of the Department renders these improvements no longer necessary or suitable for advance plan preparation. The Committee therefore respectfully recommends that your Honorable Body approve the elimination of these projects from the current Advance Plan Program.
