Harrah's Seven Mile Road Subdivision of E. ½ of E. ½ of W. ½ of N.E. ¼ Section 11, T. 1 S., R. 10 E., as recorded in Liber 57 of plats, Page 79, Wayne County Records, and as platted in Longfellow Manor, a subdivision of part of the N. 1/2 of Section 11, T. 1 S., R. 10 E., as recorded in Liber 53 of plats, Page 18, Wayne County Records, lying between the south line of Pickford Avenue, 60 feet wide, and a line extended from the center line of the 20 foot east-west alley first north of Curtis Avenue, as platted in C. Harrah's Seven Mile Road Subdivision, to the center line of the 20 foot east-west alley first north of Curtis Avenue as platted in Longfellow Manor Subdivision, be and the same is hereby vacated as a public alley to become a part and parcel of the adjoining property; and fur-

Resolved, That all of east-west public alley, 20 feet wide, north of Curtis Avenue, between Road  $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{von}$ Greenview Avenue, as platted in Longfellow Manor Subdivision, lying north of and adjoining the north line of lots 269 to 278, both inclusive, and south of and adjoining the south line of lots 268 and 279 of last mentloned subdivision, be and the same is hereby vacated as a public alley and converted into a public easement which easement shall be subject to the following covenants, agreements,

which shall be observed by the owners of the lots abutting on said alleys, and by their grantees and assigns, and their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns forever, to wit:

First, said owners hereby grant to and for the use of the public an easement or right-of-way over said vacated public alley, hereinabove described, for the purpose of installing, maintaining, repairing, removing or replacing any sewer, conduit, telephone, telegraph, electric light or other poles or things usually placed or installed in a public alley in the City of Detroit, with the right to ingress and egress at any time to and over said easement for the purposes above set forth;

Second, said owners for their heirs and assigns further agree that no buildings or structures of any nature whatsoever (except necessary fences) shall be built or placed upon easement, unless permission therefor is obtained from the City

Engineer;

Third, that said easement shall be used for the same purposes for which public alleys are generally used in the City of Detroit, excepting that the owners of such easement may prohibit the passage of vehicles therein.

## Department of Public Works June 20, 1951.

Honorable Common Council:

Gentlemen—According to obtained from the City Engineer, sixty (60) per cent of the paved street mileage lies west of Woodward Avenue and forty (40) per cent east of Woodward Avenue.

Latest estimates indicate that about 53 per cent of Detroit's population live on the West side and 47 per cent on the East side. The attached tabulation of highway funds spent in Detroit during the past eight years shows that the funds have been allocated in about the same proportion as the population. This year's allocation is a little above the population percentage, but well within the per-centage of paved streets on the east and west sides.
