Honorable Common Council:

Gentlemen—Your Committee of the Whole referred to this office for investigation and report the petition of the Department of Parks and Recreation requesting the vacation of alleys in block bounded by Joseph Campau, Mitchell, Forest and Hancock Avenues. The vacation of said alleys was approved by the City Plan Commission.

We wish to advise that our investigations are completed.

As per our request, an interdepartmental purchase order was issued by the Department of Parks and Recreation in favor of the Public Lighting Commission in the amount of \$2,200.00 to cover the cost of rerouting primary and secondary wires and transformer in the alley to be vacated.

The Department of Parks and Recreation has also issued an interdepartmental purchase order to the Department of Public Works in the amount of \$825.00 to cover the cost of removing the paved returns at the entrance to the alley and to construct new curbs and sidewalks incident thereto for the vacation of the alleys in the block bounded by Joseph Campau, Mitchell, Forest and Hancock Avenues.

A proper provision is incorporated into the vacating resolution protecting the City's interest in the sewer located in the alley to be vacated.

In reply to our inquiries, all other City departments reported that they will be unaffected by the vacation of said alleys.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution.

Resolved, That all of the north-south public alley, 18 feet wide, in

block bounded by Jos. Campau, Mitchell, Forest, and Hancock Avenues, platted in Adele Campau Thompson division of Outlot 59 of the Subdivision of Private Claim 609 known as the Joseph Campau Farm, as recorded in Liber 17, Page 17 of plats, in Louise V. Hane's Subdivision of Outlot 57 of the subdivision of Private Claim 609 known as Joseph Campau Farm, as recorded in Liber 17, Page 8 of plats, Wayne County Records, lying east of and adjoining the east line of Lot 1, east of and adjoining the east line of the north 15 feet of Lot 3, of last mentioned subdivision, east of and adjoining east line of Lots 21 to 24, both inclusive, west of and adjoining west line of Lots 25 to 28, both inclusive, of said Adele Campau Thompson Subdivision, west of and adjoining the west line of Lot 2 of Louise V. Hane's Subdivision, and west of and adjoining the west line of a 15 foot public alley lying south of Lot 2 of said Louise V. Hane's Subdivision;

Also, all of the east-west public alley, 15 feet wide, in the block bounded by Joseph Campau, Mitchell, Forest, and Hancock Avenues, as opened by dedication, deed for which was accepted by the Common Council of the City of Detroit on May 16, 1916, and which alley is in fact the north 15 feet of Lot 4 of Louise V. Hane's Subdivision of Outlot 57 of the subdivision of Private Claim 609 known as Joseph Campau Farm, as recorded in Liber 17, Page 8 of Plats, Wayne County Records, be and the same are vacated as public alleys to become a part and parcel of the adjoining property subject to the following provisions:

1. Provided, That by reason of the vacation of the above described north-south alley, the City of Detroit does not waive any rights to the sewer located therein and at all times shall have the right to enter upon the premises, if found necessary, on account of said sewer to repair, alter, or service same; and further

2. Provided, That if a building is to be constructed over said sewer, the sewer shall be replaced with cast-iron pipe of the same size, rerouted or encased in 6 inches of Class "A" concrete, or in lieu of the above, such work shall be done as will be specified by the City Engineer, all of the work mentioned to be done under the supervision and inspection of the Department of Public Works and all costs entailed to be borne by the petitioners, their successors, or assigns; and further

3. Provided, That no buildings shall be constructed over said sewer without the prior approval of such building construction by the City Engineer and the Department of Buildings

and Safety Engineering; and further provided, in the event that the sewer located in said alley, if built upon, shall break causing damage to any construction above, the petitioners and their assigns, by acceptance of the permit for buildings over said sewer, waive all claims for damage to such construction and agree to pay all costs incident to the repair of such broken sewer.
