Re: Petition No. 693 Community and Economic Development Depart-ment Vacation of Theodore Street and the alleys north and south thereof between John R and Brush

The above petition requests the vacation of the above described street

and alleys.

These vacations are necessary to complete construction of the Science Center. The requested vacations were approved by the Community and Economic Development Department.

The petition was then referred to us for investigation and report. Our report, accompanied by the original

petition is as follows:

The Community and Economic Development Department reported that the funds necessary for utility removed removal are available in Account No 14-0321-2510.

The following City Departments and private utility companies have replied that they are affected by the proposed vacations:

Detroit Edison Company: This Company replied at a meeting held on May 9, 1975 in the offices of the Community and Economic Development Department, that their estimated costs would be \$2,500.00.

Michigan Bell Telephone Company: This Company estimated their costs of abandonment at \$15,000.00.

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company: This Company estimated their cost of abandoning approximately 560 feet of 3-inch main at \$8,175.00.

Detroit Metro Water Department: The estimated cost to abandon an 8-inch and a 4-inch water main in Theodore is \$2,000.00.

Fire Department: The estimated cost to abandon one fire hydrant and relocate another is \$4,500.00.

Public Lighting Department: The estimated cost to remove overhead and underground facitities is \$3,-250.00.

Street Design Bureau-City Engineering Department: In order to prevent ponding at Theodore and John R, it will be necessary to install the following:

a) Two (2) Catch Basins b) One (1) Drop Manhole

c) 100 Linear feet of 12-inch sewer under pavement

The preliminary estimate is \$13,-200.00. The final construction cost estimate will be furnished by the Sewer Division of the Detroit Metro Water Department when plans are submitted to them.

Street Maintenance Division-Environmental Protection & Main-tenance Department: The estimated cost to remove the paved street and alley returns, construct new curb and sidewalk at the intersection with the street and alleys to be vacated is \$7500.00. This cost does not include the cost for adjusting and relocating public utility facitities located in the intersection.

Transportation-Traffic and Planning Engineering: The estimated cost to remove street signs is \$31.10.

All other City Departments have replied that they will be unaffected by the vacations or that they have reached satisfactory agreement with the petitioner.

The adoption of the attached resolution is recommended.

Re: Petition No. 2812 Sun Pipe Line Company. For removal of certain permit restrictions rela-tive to operation of a pipe line within the City.

Your Committee the of referred the above petition to this office for investigation and report. The City Engineering Department has made an investigation; our report is

as follows:

The Sun Pipe Line Company has requested that certain parts of the resolution adopted by your Honorable Body on October 25, 1932 (J.C.C. Pages 1741-42) giving permission to construct a 6-inch pipe line beginning at the intersection of Inkster Road and Eight Mile Road and ending at Decuindre, and the northern ing at Dequindre and the northerly line of the City of Hamtramck, be deleted.

refer to provisions which They

state:
(1) That maximum operating pressure of said line will be 1,000 P.S.I.
(2) That there will be a daily

patrol over the length of the line.

(3) That the line contain three automatic control valves, and

(4) That the line have an automatic pump shut down in case of failure.

Since original installation, the line was uncovered, reconditioned and reinstalled, either in a cypress box encasement filled with hydrolene or with a protective pipe coating. In addition, a cathodic protection system has been installed on the line, all to prevent external corrosion of the pipe; also

A system for continuous monitoring of the line has been installed and controls for shutdown of the line can be activated at monitoring points;

also

This line and all other similarly situated pipe lines have come under the jurisdiction of the United States Department of Transportation and the Michigan Public Service Commission, which agencies have enacted and Regulations concerning patroling of lines, operating pressure of lines, and other technical requirements governing the operation and maintenance of such lines and the industry has adopted the American National Standard Code for pressure piping as sponsored by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers; also
