As the third woman elected to Council, Mrs. Henderson has the distinction of being the first African-American woman to serve in this capacity and the first woman to be elected to the presidency; a position she has held for the last twelve years.

In addition to her historically significant position on the City Council, Mrs. Henderson has participated in a myriad of civic, political and cultural organizations. Ms. Henderson has been at the forefront of numerous struggles for social change and is the founder of the Women's Con-

terence of Concerns.

In tribute to the many contributions Mrs. Henderson has made to this city, I propose that Memorial Park, at East Jefferson and Burns Drive, be renamed, by your Honorable Body, The Erma Henderson Park. This park, located on the Detroit River, is a place Mrs. Henderson frequently visits for walks and thus is an especially appropriate place to formally recognize her efforts on behalf of Detroit.

Your concurrence, by resolution, will make official the park's renaming. A renaming ceremony can be scheduled on an appropriate date in the future.


