The name of the company under which petitioners intend to operate is the Detroit Illuminating Company, and the ordinance runs to such company as granted.

The following is the ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and granting permission to the Detroit Illuminating Company to construct, maintain and operate poles, mains, wires, pipes, conduits, lamps and conductors for the purpose of furnishing electric lighting in the City of Detroit.

It is hereby ordained by the people of the City of Detroit:

SECTION 1. Consent, permission and authority are hereby given and granted to The Detroit Illuminating Company, a body corporate under the laws of the State of Michigan, for the purpose of supplying electric light for public or private use, to erect, lay, operate and maintain in the City of Detroit all needful and proper poles, masts, towers, mains, overhead wires, pipes, lamps, motors, and other apparatus appurtenant to the said business in the City of Detroit, strictly subject, however, to the conditions and restrictions, imposed in and by this ordinance and all general ordinances of the City of Detroit hereafter adopted concerning the same or at present in force and not herewith conflicting.

SEC. 2. The said corporation shall do no injury to any street, avenue, alley, lane, park or public square, or to any shade trees, or in any manner disturb or interfere with any water or gas pipes or with any public or private sewer now or hereafter laid or constructed by any authorized person, persons or corporations, or the wires and conduits of any telephone, telegraph, electric lighting or street railway company, or of the Police, Fire, or Lighting Commission, and shall

and by the acceptance of this ordinance contracts and agrees to fully indemnify and save harmless the City of Detroit from any and all claims or damages for which said City might be made or become liable to pay by reason of the construction, maintaining, repairing, or operating of said poles, mains, conduits, towers, masts, pipes, lamps, conductors and apparatus or otherwise arising from the user or possession or the rights and privileges hereby granted or from any neglect on the part of the said corporation or its employes to comply with the ordinances of the City.

SEC. 3. All masts, towers or poles erected by said company shall be firmly set in the ground next to and within the curbstone, and so as to cause the least possible obstruction in such places and in such manner and of such uniform height, size, color and material as shall be approved or designated by the Board of Public Works.

SEC. 4. All operating and conducting mains and wires of said corporation shall be thoroughly and securely insulated with a material of sufficient thickness and durability to protect them from abrasion and other mechanical injury, and impervious to water, and approved by the City Electrician, and when laid beneath the surface of the ground, all main pipes shall be laid in streets and avenues in a line parallel with the curb line thereof, and within three feet of the curb stone or where the curb stone should be, and to a depth not exceeding two feet. It is especially required that all service pipes used by said corporation shall be connected only with a main laid in the alley or at the side of the street nearest to the building into which it is desired to conduct such service pipes.

SEC. 5. At least twenty-four hours before opening or excavating in any street, alley or any public space for the above or for any other purpose the said corporation shall notify the Board of Public Works in writing of such intention stating the place where and the object for which such opening is to be made, and in the opening and refilling of all openings and excavations made as aforesaid, the relaying of the pavements and other work necessary to the complete restoration of the streets, pavements, sidewalks or ground to an equally good condition as when disturbed; the said company or its servants or employes shall be under the supervision of the Board of Public Works or its authorized agents and shall properly comply with any order or resolution of said board or its agents, or of the Common Council in reference thereto. Nor shall any street, avenue or public space be allowed to remain open or incumbered for a longer period than shall be necessary to execute the work for which the same has been opened. And the Board of Public Works or Common Council may determine the question of such necessity.

It shall be the duty of said corporation in each instance to so relay and restore said pavements or surface at its own expense, and the said corporation at the acceptance by it of this ordinance and before the same shall become operative, shall deposit with the Board of Public Works the sum of one hundred dollars as a guarantee deposit for such relaying, refilling and restoring and shall, during the continuance of the rights conferred on it by said ordinance, maintain the said guarantee deposit at the said sum of one hundred dollars.

SEC. 6. All operating and conducting mains and wires used for or by said company within the mile circle from the city hall, or such circle as may be hereafter established by general or special ordinance, shall be placed under ground in the manner and in accordance with the restrictions described in a certain ordinance approved July 13, 1886, granting certain rights to the Edison Illuminating Company.

SEC. 7. All connecting wires entering a building or buildings shall be provided with suitable switches or cut offs at the outside of such buildings, and shall be firmly encased in substantial
