Following are the estimates in detail of the work to be done on the above paving jobs:

ALLEY NO. 71.

Assessment Estimates.

810 cubic yards of excavation. 1337.11 square yards brick on concrete paving. 1270 lineal feet, more or less, of retaining plank.

City Estimates.

35 cubic yards of excavation. Curbstones, circular, 31.40 lineal feet, in 2 circles, 2 feet radius. 4 circles, 4 feet radius, circles furnished by city; set by contractor. 81.77 square yards of brick on concrete paving. 121 lineal feet of retaining stone, old Medina curb may be used.

Note—Each bidder will name in his bid a separate price on the seven kinds of accepted brick, viz.: Nelsonville, Metropolitan, Union Paver, Athens, Buckeye, Malvern and Boien Brown Granite.

The time to be set in the contracts for the completion of the above paving and repaving jobs shall be as follows:

Alley No. 71.....June 21, 1902 Should the Common Council fail to confirm the above on or before May 6, 1902, the date of the completion shall be extended to cover any delay in confirmation beyond that date.

Said alleys to be paved according to the specifications for brick on concrete adopted by the Common Council May 24, 1901; also to the estimates of the City Engineer, as above, and the charter and ordinances of the City of Detroit.

For the above work the bidders will state the quantities and place the amount for which they will furnish the material and perform the work required, so as to show the aggregate cost of the work.

Each bidder must deposit with his bid, inclosed in a separate envelope, a certified bank check, payable to the order of the Department of Public Works of the City of Detroit, as follows:

Alley No. 71.....\$300 Which sum will be forfeited to the Department in case the bidder refuses or neglects to enter into contract, subject to confirmation by the Common Council, for the work within five days after he has been awarded the contract. Checks deposited with rejected bids will be returned to the bidder on demand.

The bidder whose tender is accepted will be required to furnish with his contract an approved bond to the City of Detroit in the sum of 20 per cent of the amount of the contract price for the work, conditioned on the full and faithful performance of his part of the contract.

No bids will be accepted from any person or firm in arrears to the City of Detroit, upon debt or contract, or who is in default as surety otherwise upon any obligation to said city.

On the proper execution of the contract bond the amount deposited with the tender will be returned to the contractor.

Printed specifications in detail for the class of pavement above referred to and for which proposals are asked may be had of the Secretary.

The Department of Public Works expressly reserves the right to reject any or all proposals.
