For the above work bidders will state the price per cubic yard for excavation, price per lineal foot for curbing, price per square yard for paving or concreting, and price per lineal foot for retaining plank or stone, etc.

Bids will only be received for the entire of the work or material for any street or section of street, as per quantities stated in the estimates, and the bid will be accepted which is the lowest on aggregating the above details, regardless of any error of extension or footings made by the bidders.

The contractor shall be paid in bonds, or the proceeds thereof, if such bonds are purchased by the Sinking Fund Commissioners according to law.

No bids will be accepted from any person or firm who is in arrears to the City of Detroit upon debt or contract, or who is in default as surety, or otherwise upon any obligation to said city.
