

of public improvements where a street is graded, comprising the property hereinbefore described, upon which they shall assess and levy the amount of \$1,119.17, each lot or parcel to be assessed at a ratable proportion as near as may be said amount in accordance with the amount of benefit derived by such improvement.

And it is further resolved, That \$559.58 of the award of the jury be paid by the City of Detroit out of the street opening fund.

And further resolved, That said assessment shall be made in one part, which shall become due and payable in 60 days after the first publication by the Receiver of Taxes of the notice of said assessment.

#### Ordinances.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—Your Committee on Ordinances to whom was referred the petitions of John Breitmeyer's Sons et al., requesting that the name of Miami avenue be changed to Broadway, also of Arthur J. Farmer, et al., asking that the name of Monroe avenue be also changed to Broadway, respectfully report that we have had both of said petitions under consideration and beg leave to report to your honorable body that we see no objection to changing the name of Miami avenue as suggested. The street, which but a few years since was entirely occupied by residences, is now well built up as a business thoroughfare and is bound in time to become one of the leading mercantile thoroughfares of the City. One of the strongest drawbacks against its earlier occupation by retail stores was the delay occasioned in establishing a street line, and which after being bitterly fought by both sides finally resulted in the city vacating approximately nine feet on each side of the avenue between the sidewalk and lot lines to the abutting owners. Their request in our judgment should be complied with, but not so with the owners and occupants of the property situated on Monroe avenue and Randolph street, and this for various reasons, principally the following: 1st. Monroe avenue runs almost at right angles with Miami avenue, and is in no form, shape or manner whatever a continuation of Miami avenue; 2nd. Miami avenue and Monroe avenue while not only running in different directions, are separated by the triangle at the intersection of Gratiot, Randolph and Miami avenue, which was recently changed to "Pingree Square" by an ordinance passed by this Council, which would unquestionably result in more or less confusion because it would separate one section of "Broadway" (Miami—north line of Gratiot to south line of Witherell) from the other section, viz.: Monroe avenue from Campus Martius to west line of Randolph street, should the name of the latter avenue be changed as desired, and furthermore, it is bad enough now for some of our own people to find out where they

are at because of the peculiar plan of the City in the central portion, without attempting to measure the added confusion it would cause to the thousands of strangers who annually visit our city. Randolph street is now divided into two sections, and while but a comparatively short distance apart, the very fact that a portion of said street is renamed and made a part of a square, will ultimately be confusing and eventually result in changing the name of one or the other ends to some other name. Monroe avenue is more of a continuation of Monroe avenue east of Randolph street than any other thoroughfare, and it was a long struggle to change the name of Croghan street to Monroe avenue, but the Council at that time saw the wisdom of making the change and the merchants became well satisfied, and any attempt made to re-name this avenue should be entirely disregarded.

We therefore recommend that the prayers of the last named petitioners be denied, and that the request for changing the name of Miami avenue to Broadway be granted, and we therefore offer the following ordinance, which we recommend be passed.

#### Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE changing the name of the street and highway heretofore known as Miami avenue to Broadway. It is hereby ordained by the people of the City of Detroit:

Section 1. That the name of the street and highway in the City of Detroit heretofore known as Miami avenue be and the same is hereby designated and shall hereafter be known as "Broadway."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take immediate effect.

Read twice by title, ordered printed and unanimous consent being granted placed on the order of third reading.
