The following is the ordinance:

Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled, "An ordinance prescribing certain limits within the City of Detroit where saloons, where spirituous, intoxicating or malt liquors are sold as a beverage shall not hereafter be established or maintained, and spirituous, intoxicating or malt liquors sold thereon, and to repeal all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith, approved January 2, 1908," by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 6 (A).

It is hereby ordained by the people of the City of Detroit:

Section 1. That the ordinance entitled "An Ordinance prescribing certain limits within the City of Detroit where saloons where spirituous, intoxicating or malt liquors are sold as a beverage shall not hereafter be established and maintained, and spirituous, intoxicating or malt liquors sold thereon, and to repeal all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith, approved January 2, 1908," be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 6 (A), which shall read as follows:

Sec. 6 (A). No saloon where spirituous, intoxicating or malt liquors are sold as a beverage shall be hereafter established and maintained within the territory within the City of Detroit described as follows:

"All that portion of the city bounded on the east by the center line of Fifth street; on the south by a line 100 feet distant northerly from the northerly line of Michigan avenue; on the west by the center line of Trumbull avenue, and on the north by a line 100 feet distant southerly from the southerly line of Grand River avenue.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take immediate effect.
