 Whereas, Knodell avenue is opened from Gratiot to Van Dyke avenue, except through a four-acre piece of property, which appears in the atlas as the property of John Schreer; and  
 Whereas, The Fire Commission is building a fire house on Knodell avenue between Gratiot and Van Dyke avenues, thereby making it desirable to throughout the entire length between Gratiot and Van Dyke avenues; and  
 Whereas, The School Board is preparing to have the said four-acre piece of property condemned for the purpose of erecting a school building thereon; and

**AN ORDINANCE changing the name of La Salle Gardens East and La Salle Gardens West to La Salle Boulevard.**  
 IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:  
 Section 1. That the name of the street and highway known as LA SALLE GARDENS EAST and the name of the street and highway known as LA SALLE GARDENS WEST be and the same are hereby changed to and shall be known as LA SALLE BOULEVARD.  
 Sec. 2. This Ordinance shall take immediate effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.  
 Read twice by title, ordered printed and laid on the table.

**AN ORDINANCE changing the name of LaSalle Avenue, between McGraw Avenue and the Michigan Central Railroad, to Bangor Avenue.**  
 IT IS HERBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:  
 Section 1. That the name of the street and highway known as LaSalle Avenue, between the right-of-way of the Michigan Central Railroad and McGraw Avenue be and the same is hereby changed to and shall be known as Bangor Avenue.  
 Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take immediate effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.  
 Read twice by title, ordered printed and laid on the table.

By Councilman Watson:  
**AN ORDINANCE to amend Section S9 of an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE to regulate the use, handling, storage and sale of Inflammable Liquids and the products thereof in the City of Detroit."**  
 IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:  
 Section 1. That Section 89, paragraph (d) of an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE to regulate the use, handling, storage and sale of Inflammable Liquids in the City of Detroit," be amended to read as follows:  
 Section 89, paragraph (d). Repair pits, etc. No repair pits, turn tables, or other depressions shall be allowed on ground floors unless the bottoms of such depressions are six (6) inches above the grade and ventilated from two sides to prevent the accumulation of vapors heavier than air, except that in garages where vehicles are stored weighing five tons or more and having less than twelve (12) inches bottom clearance, repair pits may be installed provided that they are properly drained, provided with sumps and ventilated with a power-driven ventilating fan which must be kept operating at all times. Repair pits may be used on any floor of a garage except the first floor where vapors can be vented off naturally without mechanical means.  
 Sec. 2. This ordinance is hereby declared to be necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and is hereby given immediate effect.  
 Read twice by title, ordered printed and laid on the table.

By Councilman Watson:  
 Whereas, This Common Council has been reliably informed that its genial Sergeant-at-Arms, Alvin B.
