ORDINANCE NO. 747-A

AN ORDINANCE to provide for and the Maintenance of Public Pounds, and for the designating of a Pound Master, and prescribing the powers and duties thereof:

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That the Department of Public Welfare shall provide and maintain on the Eastern Public Market, and may provide and maintain on the Western Public Market, a public pound, and the Weigh Master is hereby designated as Pound Master without compensation.

Sec. 2. No animal or fowl shall be permitted to run at large within the limits of the City of Detroit: Provided that this ordinance shall not be construed to apply to dogs.

Sec. 3. It is hereby made the duty of the Poundmaster and the City Police, and it shall be lawful for any other person to capture and convey to the public pound and to deliver to the Poundmaster any animal or fowl which may be found running at large within the limits of the City of Detroit or that may be left standing on the public markets in violation of the Public Market Ordinance or the market rules and regulations made under its authority. In the absence of the Poundmaster the police shall impound any such animal or fowl and give to the Poundmaster the required data with reference to it for his records.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Poundmaster:

1. To receive, feed and properly care for any animal or fowl lawfully brought to the public pound.

2. To make a proper record of each animal or fowl delivered to the pound, including the kind of animal or fowl, the date and hour of its delivery to him, the name and address and badge number, if any, of the person delivering the animal or fowl, the date and place where it was found, the date of redemption or the name and address of the person redeeming or purchasing such animal or fowl, the amount of pound fees or sale price, and such other pertinent information as may seem desirable in order to have a complete record of each case.

3. To deliver to the owner or his authorized representative, upon satisfactory proof of ownership taken under oath, without charge, on a form provided, and upon the payment of the proper fee, any impounded animal or fowl, provided such animal or fowl shall not be suffering with a disease or shall not be in such poor physical condition as to warrant, in the opinion of the Poundmaster, its being turned over to the Humane Officer for further detention medical treatment, or death, in order to protect the public health and welfare.

4. To collect the pound fees hereinafter provided, or the amounts derived from the sale of the impounded animals as hereinafter provided, and to issue to the payee proper receipts therefor.

5. To account, under oath, in such form and at such times as the Department of Public Welfare, with the approval of the City Controller, may direct, for all moneys received and collected by him in his official capacity.

6. To sell at the public pound to the highest bidder any healthy animal fit for work, or healthy fowl which has not been claimed by the owner within three days from the date it was impounded, or on which the owner refuses or neglects to pay the accrued charges to the Poundmaster, provided that no such sale shall be made until the Police Department has been notified and shall have sufficient time to ascertain if the animal to be sold has been reported to said Department as lost or stolen. Notice of such sale shall be given at least three days prior thereto. Such notice shall contain a general description of the animal or fowl to be sold, and shall be posted on bulletin boards at the City Hall, the County Court House and the office of the Poundmaster; provided that if any animal shall have been impounded which, in the opinion of the Poundmaster, is worthless, he shall, without holding the animal three days, immediately turn such animal over to a local Humane Officer for proper disposition. The Poundmaster shall not dispose of any animal which, by reason of

AN ORDINANCE to repeal certain obsolete ordinances of the City of Detroit.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That Chapter 17 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved March 12, 1881 (wood inspector), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. That Chapter 35 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Feb. 27, 1912 (receipt for money), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. That Chapter 37 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Oct. 29, 1912 (cancelling orders), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. That Chapter 41 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Feb. 20, 1880 (Distribution of City Publications), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. That Chapter 119 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved August 16, 1881 (Board of Health), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. That Chapter 125 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Sept. 7, 1881 (Health Regulation), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. That Chapter 126 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Jan. 30, 1912 (Roller Towels), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. That Chapter 127 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Jan. 10, 1906 (Spitting), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 9. That Chapter 131 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved May 14, 1901 (Construction of Buildings), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 10. That Chapter 143 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Nov. 7, 1911 (milk bottles), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. That Chapter 114 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved July 30, 1912 (Probation Officer), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 12. That Chapter 154 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Oct. 11, 1898 (Public Markets), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 13. That Chapter 157 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved March 22, 1898 (Collection of License Money), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 14. That Chapter 159 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved April 21, 1870 (Manufacturers of Bread), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 15. That Chapter 160 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved April 3, 1900 (Sale of Coal), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 16. That Chapter 164 of the Compiled Ordinances of Detroit, of 1912, approved Jan. 2, 1862 (Meat Peddlers), be and the same is hereby repealed.

debility, disease, lameness or injury, is permanently unfit for work, except to an organization designed for the humane keeping, treatment or killing of such animals or to a humane officer.

7. To place a sign on his office door giving his title, name, address and telephone number, if any, and office hours.

8. To keep or see that the pound is kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

Sec. 5. The following fees shall be assessed and collected by the Poundmaster before releasing to the owner, or his authorized representative, any impounded animal or fowl; for receiving and delivering any animal, the sum of One Dollar; for keeping and feeding any animal, the sum of twenty-five cents for each six hours or fraction thereof; for receiving and delivering any fowl, the sum of fifteen cents, and for keeping and feeding any fowl, the sum of ten cents per day or fraction thereof.

Sec. 6. No person shall break, attempt to break or assist in

breaking into the public pound, nor liberate any impounded animal or fowl except at the direction or with the knowledge and permission of the Poundmaster.

Sec. 7. No person shall knowingly capture or take to the public pound any animal or fowl not legally liable to be impounded therein.

Sec. 8. Any person violating or failing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed One Hundred Dollars and costs, or imprisonment in the Detroit House of Correction for a period of not to exceed 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the Court.

Sec. 9. Chapter 203 of the Compiled Ordinances of the City of Detroit for the year 1912 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 10. This ordinance shall take immediate effect thirty days after its approval.
