

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its approval. Read twice by title, ordered printed and laid on the table.

By Councilman Ewald: AN ORDINANCE changing the name of Boston Boulevard between Linwood Avenue and McQuade Avenue to Boston Avenue.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT

Section 1. That the name of the street and highway heretofore known as Boston Boulevard, extending from Linwood Avenue to McQuade Avenue, be and the same is hereby changed to and shall be known as Boston Avenue.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take immediate effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor. Read twice by title, ordered printed and laid on the table.

Councilman Vernor moved that the Committee of the Whole be discharged from further consideration of an ordinance to regulate the installation of heating and warming systems or apparatus in dwellings in the City of Detroit, referred May 31, (J. C. C. p. 990) which motion prevailed as follows: Yeas—Councilmen Bradley, Castator, Ewald, Kronk, Littlefield, Vernor, Watson and the President Pro Tem—8.

Nays—None. Councilman Vernor then moved that the ordinance be placed on order of third reading. The ordinance was then placed on the order of third reading.

Third Reading of Ordinance. The title to the ordinance was read a third time.

The ordinance was then read. Councilman Watson presented the following as a substitute ordinance: AN ORDINANCE to Regulate the Installation of Heating and Warning Systems or apparatus in dwellings in the City of Detroit.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. No person, firm or corporation shall install or cause to be installed any heating or warming system or apparatus, other than stoves, in dwellings in the City of Detroit, without a license from the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering.

Said licenses to be issued to persons, firms or corporations competent to make such installations by the Commissioner of Buildings and Safety Engineering. The Commissioner may, after reasonable notice and hearing, revoke or suspend such license for any violation of any rule or regulation of the Department, or any code or ordinance under which the Department operates.

Sec. 2. Contractors will furnish to the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering a copy of specifications for proposed installations which will be checked over by the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering and become a part of the plan of use building. The Department will use the Manufacturers' rating for proposed apparatus and, finding it sufficient in heating capacity for the building, will issue a permit for the same.

Sec. 3. On receipt of notice from the contractor, the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering will cause an inspection to be made to see that the proposed specifications are carried out and will attach to the furnace or heating system, in a conspicuous place, a certificate of such inspection to the effect that the installation meets with the approval of the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering.

Sec. 4. The Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering shall furnish uniform application blanks designed to contain the required information, for a public record.

Sec. 5. The Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering shall make such reasonable charge for this work as in their opinion will make the Inspection Department self-sustaining. Fees to accompany permits when asked for.

Sec. 6. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering from issuing a permit to any person skilled in the art of installing any system of heating apparatus in his own dwelling without taking out a license for same, provided he complies with the ordinance regulating a permit.

Sec. 7. Violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00 or imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 8. Any ordinance or parts of ordinance in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 9. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval.

Councilman Littlefield moved that the substitute ordinance be passed. Councilman Bradley moved that the substitute ordinance be referred to Committee of the Whole for further consideration. Which motion did not prevail as follows:

Yeas—Councilmen Bradley and Castator—2.

Nays—Councilmen Ewald, Kronk, Littlefield, Vernor Watson and the President Pro Tem—6.

The question being "Shall this ordinance now pass?" the ordinance was passed, a majority of the Councilmen present voting therefor as follows:

Yeas—Councilmen Ewald, Littlefield, Vernor, Watson and the President Pro Tem—5.

Nays—Councilmen Castator and Kronk—2.

Councilman Bradley was excused from voting. The title to ordinance was confirmed. And the Council then adjourned.

## COMMUNICATIONS

From the Mayor.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen—I am returning herewith without my approval "An ordinance to regulate the installation of heating and warming systems or apparatus in dwellings in the City of Detroit," passed by your Honorable Body at the session held June 6, 1922.

My reasons for disapproval are set forth in the following letter received by me this day from Frank Burton, Commissioner of the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering: "Honorable John C. Lodge, Acting Mayor, City of Detroit, Michigan.

Dear Sir—I have examined the Heating Ordinance approved by the Honorable Common Council on June 6th last and find that to enforce this ordinance will require between ten and fifteen inspectors and clerks at a cost of from \$25,000 to \$35,000 per year.

I consider the expense of enforcing this ordinance to be all out of proportion to the good which can be accomplished. In addition, this ordinance fails to guarantee to the citizens the protection it is presumed to provide.

This Department is urgently in need of men to perform important public service, particularly in the line of building inspection, but for reasons of economy I have refrained from asking for more assistance.

In view of this it seems very unwise to add to the city payroll a number of additional employes whose usefulness is questionable.
