

ORDINANCE No. 15-B

(Cancel Sections 2 and 3 on page 323, and insert this ordinance opposite thereto.)

AN ORDINANCE to amend Sections 2 and 3 of Chapter 116 of the Compiled Ordinances of the City of Detroit for the year 1920.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That sections 2 and 3 of Chapter 116 of the Compiled Ordinances of the City of Detroit for the year 1920 are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Hereafter no person shall by himself or by another post, attach, place, print, paint or stamp any placard, circular, showbill or advertisement of any description whatever, except such as may be expressly authorized by law, on any street, or sidewalk, or upon any election booth or other public place or upon any place or object, with the exception of bill boards, in the City of Detroit, or upon any fence, building or property belonging to the City of Detroit, or upon any telegraph pole, telephone pole, electric light pole or tower, or upon any hitching post, horse block or curb stone in any public street or alley in the City of Detroit or upon any premises occupied or unoccupied without the consent of the owner, lessor or lessee first having been obtained and no person shall throw or place or through insecure fastening or otherwise cause or suffer to be placed or thrown or to fall in or upon any street, alley, sidewalk or other public thoroughfare or any public park of the City of Detroit, any loose paper or other rubbish of any nature.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or shall fail to comply with the same, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the Detroit House of Correction for a period of not less than 30 days or more than 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the offender.

AN ORDINANCE changing the name of Northfield avenue, between Woodside avenue and Central avenue to West-

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT.

Section 1. That the name of the street and highway known as Northfield avenue, extending from Woodside avenue to Central avenue, be and the same is hereby changed to and shall be known as Westfield avenue.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take immediate effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

ORDINANCE No. 8-B

(Insert opposite Page 159.)

AN ORDINANCE directing and authorizing the widening of roadbeds on certain named streets and avenues and providing for the repaving or resurfacing of same and the paving of area of said roadbeds as widened.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to widen the following roadbeds from curb to curb.

Eliot street, from John F. street to Brush street, from twenty-six (26) feet to thirty-four (34) feet.

Eliot street, from Brush street to St. Antoine street, from twenty-six (26) feet to thirty-four (34) feet.

Mack avenue, from Riopelle street to Gratiot avenue, from twenty-six (26) feet to thirty-four (34) feet.

McDougall avenue, from Charlevoix avenue to Gratiot avenue, from thirty (30) feet to thirty-six (36) feet, and from Gratiot avenue to Palmer avenue, from twenty-eight (28) feet to thirty-six (36) feet.

Clairmount avenue, from Woodward avenue to Linwood avenue, from twenty-six (26) feet to thirty-six (36) feet, and to resurface or repave said roadbeds, where required, and to pave the area of said roadbeds as widened.

Section 2. This ordinance is hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and is hereby given immediate effect.

COMMON COUNCIL

(OFFICIAL)

Detroit, Tuesday, March 7th, 1922.

The Council met and was called to order by the President, Hon. John C. Lodge.

Present—Councilmen Bradley, Castator, Ewald, Kronk, Littlefield, Nagel, Vernor, Watson and the President.

There being a quorum present, the Council was declared to be in session.

The journal of the preceding session was approved.

Taken From the Table.

Councilman Kronk moved to take from the table an Ordinance changing the name of Pelouze Avenue to Inwood Avenue, laid on the table December 20th, 1921, (J. C. C. p. 2245) which motion prevailed.

The ordinance was then indefinitely postponed.

COMMUNICATIONS.

From the Mayor.

To the Honorable the Common Council: Gentlemen—I am returning herewith the proceedings of the Common Council, of the session of February 28, 1922, and have approved all of the proceedings with the exception of:

"That Resolution which requires the Department of Public Works and the Department of Parks and Boulevards to transmit to the Controller supplemental estimates in the sum of \$49,562.50, and \$4,555.30 respectively, for the widening and providing of a parkway in Madison Avenue, from Witherell to Randolph Street."

I disapprove of this resolution for the following reasons:

First—I do not feel this public improvement is necessary at this time.

Second—Every effort has been made by this office to keep down the taxes for this year and I am quite confident that this improvement can remain in abeyance for some time.

Third—I am opposed to any improvement which provides for parkways in the center of the street for the reason that I do not believe parks should be provided in public highways, in view of the demand for more street service all the time.

I also disapprove of:

"That Resolution which declares a public improvement necessary in the extension of the Western Market."

for the following reasons:

First—Because the description includes that block to the north of the present market which the Market Bureau and I do not believe is necessary at this time.

The Market Bureau believes, with me, that that portion which you have ordered condemned south of the block

referred to, is all that is necessary at this time. To condemn the entire block to the north of the market is an unnecessary burden upon the taxpayers at this time. It can be readily condemned at some later date when the necessity is more obvious.

It seems to me that the Common Council, in view of the strain upon the taxpayers, due to the industrial depression which has been with us for some time, should eliminate absolutely every public improvement which can be delayed.

This applies not only to the above proposed market extension but to the condemning of more property for proposed parks and playgrounds and for the widening and opening of streets.
