

47 and west ¼ line of Section 12;
48 thence westerly along the east
49 and west ¼ line of Section 12
50 to a point 60 feet westerly of
51 and at right angles to the east
52 line of Oakfield Avenue extend-
53 ed northerly; thence southerly
54 along a line 60 feet west of and
55 parallel to the east line of Oak-
56 field Avenue and said line ex-
57 tended northerly to a point 200
58 feet north of and at right angles
59 to the center line of the Six
60 Mile Road which is also the
61 southerly line of Section 12, T.
62 1, S. R. 10 E. thence westerly
63 along a line 200 feet north of
64 and parallel to the center line
65 of the Six Mile Road which is
66 also the southerly line of Sec-
67 tion 12, T. 1, S. R. 10 E. to a
68 point in the center of Mill Road
69 which is also the westerly line
70 of Section 12, T. 1, S. R. 10 E;
71 thence southerly along the cen-
72 ter line of Mill Road which is
73 also the westerly line of Sec-
74 tions 12, 13, 24 and 25, T. 1,
75 S. R. 10 E. to the northerly line
76 of the Pere Marquette Railroad
77 right of way; thence easterly
78 along the northerly line of the
79 Pere Marquette Railroad right
80 of way to the place of begin-
81 ning.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts
2 of ordinances in conflict here-
3 with are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance is
2 hereby declared to be immedi-
3 ately necessary for the preser-
4 vation of the public peace,
5 health and safety, and shall be
6 given immediate effect.
The ordinance was then placed on
the order of third reading.

Third Reading of Ordinance.

The title to the ordinance was read
a third time.

The ordinance was then read.

The question being "Shall this
ordinance now pass." The ordi-
nance was passed, a majority of
the councilmen present voting
therefor as follows:

Yeas—Councilmen Bradley, Brod-
erick, Castator, Dingeman, Murphy,
Nagel, Stevenson and the President
Pro Tem—8.

Nays—None.

Reconsideration.

Councilman Castator moved to
reconsider the vote by which the
ordinance was adopted.

Councilman Bradley moved to
suspend Rule 23 for the purpose of
indefinitely postponing the motion
to reconsider, which motion pre-
vailed as follows:

Yeas—Councilmen Bradley, Brod-
erick, Castator, Dingeman, Murphy,
Nagel, Stevenson and the President
Pro Tem—8.

Nays—None.

Councilman Nagel then moved
that the motion to reconsider be in-
definitely postponed, which motion
prevailed. The regular order was
resumed.

By Councilman Castator:

**AN ORDINANCE to amend Section
92 of an ordinance entitled: "An
Ordinance to regulate the use,
handling, storage and sale of In-
flammable Liquids and the Prod-
ucts thereof in the City of De-
troit."**

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY
THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF
DETROIT.

Section 1. That Section 92 of
2 an ordinance entitled: "An ordi-
3 nance to regulate the use, handling,
4 storage and sale of inflammable
5 liquids and the products thereof in
6 the City of Detroit" be amended to
7 read as follows:

Section 92. Area. A minor gar-
2 age shall not have over eight hun-
3 dred (800) square feet of floor area
4 upon which motor cars may be
5 stored.

(a) Location of minor garages.
2 No minor garage shall be located
3 on the depth of lot within the lim-
4 its required by the State Housing
5 Code as enforced by the Board of
6 Health of the City of Detroit, ex-
7 cept that fireproof minor garages
8 may be attached to a dwelling if
9 cut off therefrom by an unpierced
10 fireproof wall, or may be located
11 less than ten feet from dwelling
12 provided light and air of dwelling
13 are not interfered with and pro-
14 vided a solid masonry wall is built
15 on the side of the garage toward
16 the dwelling.

(b). Frame minor garages. No
2 minor garage of frame construc-
3 tion for more than two automobiles
4 or more than 400 square feet in
5 area shall be located within three
6 (3) feet of a side lot line except
7 that when a three (3) foot clear
8 passage is maintained on one side,
9 the other side may be built on, or
10 less than three (3) feet from the
11 side lot line if the end wall is con-
12 structed of masonry not less than
13 eight (8) inches thick extending
14 to the underside of the roof if
15 pitched, or eighteen (18) inches
16 above roof, if flat. Such masonry
17 walls shall have foundations as
18 called for in the building code.

(c) A one-story garage of frame
2 construction may be built on a
3 concrete floor slab without addition-
4 al foundation if the slab is at least
5 five (5) inches thick and of a one-
6 three-five (1-3-5) mixture.

(d) Minor garages outside of
2 the fire limits (Districts 1 and 2)
3 may be built two (2) stories high
4 and of frame construction if walls
5 and ceiling of the garage portion
6 are covered with metal lath and

7 cement plaster. A separate stair-
8 way, protected with metal lath and
9 cement plaster or equivalent shall
10 be provided from second story
11 direct to outside, without a con-
12 nection to garage. The second
13 story of a frame garage shall not
14 be used for living apartments of
15 any character.

(e) Fireproof minor garages. A
2 minor garage built of fireproof ma-
3 terials, as specified in this Code,
4 may be located on side lot line and
5 may have living apartments above
6 if a fireproof exit is provided from
7 the living apartments directly to
8 the ground and independent of the
9 garage. The stairway shall be pro-
10 tected with at least a two (2) inch
11 wall of metal lath and cement
12 plaster or other incombustible ma-
13 terials. There shall be no connec-
14 tion to garage from stairway. The
15 floor above this type of garage
16 shall be of cement or other ap-
17 proved fireproof construction. Walls
18 above such garages shall be of
19 solid masonry unless three (3) feet
20 or more back from the outer face
21 of the wall below. Windows or
22 doors from such garages, opening
23 onto porches or other roofed-over
24 areas, shall be fire windows or
25 doors. When the roof projects over
26 the walls of minor garages with
27 living apartments above, such pro-
28 jections shall be faced or protect-
29 ed with sheet metal or other in-
30 combustible material.

(f) In minor garages where
2 dormer windows are set back at
3 least three feet from the gutter
4 edge, such windows may have plain
5 glass and wood sash.

(g) Sheet metal garages. A
2 minor sheet metal garage shall not
3 be considered fireproof. However,
4 a sheet metal garage housing not
5 over two cars may be erected with-
6 in the fire limits if kept five (5)
7 feet from the side lot line or other
8 building on the side and otherwise
9 complying with the limits on depth
10 of lot required by the State Hous-
11 ing Code.

**AN ORDINANCE changing the name
of certain streets and avenues in
the City of Detroit.**
IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY
THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF
DETROIT:

Section 1. That the names
2 of the following streets and
3 avenues in the City of Detroit,
4 to-wit:
5 Dawson avenue, from Connor's
6 Avenue to Harper Avenue.
7 Cranquille avenue, from alley
8 south of Wilshire drive to
9 Rosemary avenue,
10 Frass Avenue, from Alga Ave-
11 nue to Harper Avenue,
12 Dolan Avenue, from alley south

13 of Wilshire Drive to Glen-
14 field Avenue,
15 Second Boulevard, from Six
16 Mile Road to Covington
17 Drive,
18 be and the same are hereby re-
19 spectively changed to and shall
20 be known as Gunston Avenue,
21 Gunston Avenue, Barrett Ave-
22 nue, Barrett Avenue and Sec-
23 ond Avenue.

Section 2. This ordinance
2 shall take immediate effect
3 thirty days after its approval
4 by the Mayor.

By Councilman Nagel:

Through this country of ours
from ocean to ocean, and from the
Canadian frontier on the north to
Mexico's boundaries on the south, the
people deeply and sincerely mourn the
death of Woodrow Wilson, twenty-
eighth President of the nation that

in world affairs.

Our country has lost a great leader,
and the annals of history will record
him with generous judgment as a
statesman, who has left his country-
men a heritage of public service, that
will be an inspiration for future gen-
erations, indissolubly linked with the
historic Washington and the beloved
Lincoln.

This Common Council, representa-
tive of the citizens of Detroit, with a
deep and sincere realization of the af-
fliction that has fallen upon our city,
state and nation in the death of ex-
President Woodrow Wilson, extends
its sincere sympathy to his beloved
wife and family in the great sorrow
that has been visited upon them, and

of our esteem and respect for the
