ORDINANCE NO. 134-B.

(Insert opposite page 724)

AN ORDINANCE to empower the Board of Water Commissioners to make connections or disconnections from water mains to lot lines, and to charge the cost thereof to the property served, to provide a method for the collection of such charge, and to provide for the maintenance of such service by the Board of Water Commissioners.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That hereafter whenever necessary to make connections from water mains to lot lines, the same shall be made by the Board of Water Commissioners of the City of Detroit, and the said Board shall, whenever necessary, make all disconnections from the said mains to the said lot lines, and the cost thereof shall be charged against the property to which the service connection runs, the cost of said service to be paid for on terms to be established by the Board of Water Commissioners.

Section 2. Whenever any repairs are necessary to any service connection between the lot line and the main the Board of Water Commissioners shall immediately cause same to be repaired without cost to the property owner or person responsible.

Section 3. If any person, firm or corporation for whose benefit the said taps or connections are made, refuses to pay the cost provided for in Section 1 of this ordinance, within the time specified, the charge may then become a lien on the property and the Board of Water Commissioners may enforce collection of any such bill in the manner provided by law.

Section 4. In the event of an areaway intervening between any water main and lot line, the service shall cease on the inside of the areaway.

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect on July 1, 1924.

COMMUNICATIONS.

From the Acting Mayor.

To the Honorable the Common Council:

Gentlemen—I am returning, herewith, the proceedings of your session of September 30, and have approved all these except a resolution instructing the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering to issue a permit to Karol Szczudlo for the construction of a temporary one story steel building on the north side of Michigan avenue between Renville and Ogden avenues.

Commissioner Burton of the Department of Buildings and Safety Engineering informs me that the petitioner stated that he requested permission to erect this temporary building because of the condemnation proceedings of Michigan avenue but that, as a matter of fact, no part of the north side of Michigan avenue is to be taken in this condemnation proceeding although a strip on the south side is so included. Commissioner Burton further says that his department has recommended that permission for temporary buildings on the south side of Michigan avenue be granted in justice to the property owners, but that there is no reason for the granting of any such permission for property on the north side of the street.

I must agree with the position taken by the Commissioner, therefore, return this part of your proceedings without my approval.
