

ORDINANCE NO. 198-B

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 5 of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance regulating the business of moving household goods and furniture, store furniture, fixtures and stock, for hire in the City of Detroit, defining public movers, providing for a license and bond for public movers and providing penalties for the violation thereof."

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Sec. 1. That Section 5 of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance regulating the business of moving household goods and furniture, store furniture, fixtures and stock, for hire in the City of Detroit, defining public movers, providing for a license and bond for public movers and providing penalties for the violation thereof," be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 5. Before the license provided for in the foregoing section shall be issued, such applicant shall file an approved surety company bond to the City of Detroit in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the use and benefit of the City of Detroit and such person or persons for whom the applicant shall do moving, conditioned for the faithful performance of his, it, or their duties as a public mover, and, for the performance of all duties required by law relating to the safe and prompt delivery to the proper person or persons of all household goods, furniture, office furniture, fixtures or personal property entrusted to the mover for moving and as a security for the payment to the proper person or persons of all damages to real or personal property caused by such mover and for which it shall by law be responsible.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

ORDINANCE NO. 273-B

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 6 of Chapter 37 of the Compiled Ordinances of the City of Detroit of 1920.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That Section 6 of Chapter 37 of the Compiled Ordinances of the City of Detroit of the year 1920, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 6. No person shall make or continue, or cause to be made or continued, any cellar, door, windows or areas, or dig or construct or cause to be dug or constructed, any area or entrance thereto, around any cellar or basement story of any building, or dig or construct, or cause to be dug or constructed, any vault so that the same shall extend into the line of any street, alley or public place, without first presenting a petition and detailed drawing to the Common Council and obtain its approval, and thereafter obtaining the approval of the Department of Buildings and a permit from the Department of Public Works, upon the filing of said drawings with said Department of Public Works. Provided, that where such permits are granted they may be revoked on the order of the Common Council, when the cellar doors, areas or vaults shall be forthwith removed from the line of the street, alley or public place by the owner of the property, or at his expense; and provided, further, that no cellar door, window or area shall extend more than 3 feet beyond building or lot line on any street where the sidewalk space is less than 18 and more than 10 feet wide, nor more than 4 feet beyond the building or lot line where the sidewalk space is more than 18 feet wide, and shall be protected by solid cover pavement; and that no vault shall be dug or constructed so that the outer face of the wall shall extend beyond a point at least 2 feet from the curb line of a street.

Detroit, Tuesday, January 25, 1927.
