

ORDINANCE NO. 238-B

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 3 of Chapter 154 of the Compiled Ordinances of the City of Detroit for the year 1920.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Chapter 154 of the Compiled Ordinances of the City of Detroit for the year 1920, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 3. No building, place or lot where junk, rags, old rope, paper, bagging, old iron, brass, copper tin, empty bottles, salvaged parts of old automobiles, old lumber and house wrecking material, slush or lead, shall be hereafter used, established or maintained within the territory within the City of Detroit described as follows:

All that portion of the city bounded on the north by Canfield Avenue, on the south by Woodbridge Street, on the east by the west line of Chene Street, and on the west by the east line of Dequindre Street.

Also all that portion of the City bounded on the north by the center line of Canfield Avenue, south by the center line of Alexandrine Avenue, east by the center line of Hastings Street and west by the center line of Beaubien Street.

Also all that portion of the City bounded on the north by the center line of Canfield Avenue, south by the center line of Woodbridge Street, east by the center line of Hastings Street, and west by the center line of Beaubien Street.

Also all that portion of the City of Detroit bounded on the north by the center line of Brewster Street, on the south by the center line of Alfred Street, on the west by the center line of Orleans Street and on the east by the east line of Dequindre Street. Also all that portion of the city bounded on the north by the center line of Wilkins Street on the south by the center line of Brewster Street, on the east by the center line of Dequindre Street, and on the west by the center line of Orleans Street.

Also all that portion of the City of Detroit within the territory described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the National Boundary Line

with the center line of Chene Street projected; thence northerly along said line and along the center line of Chene Street to the intersection of said center line with the center line of Joseph Campau Avenue in East Grand Boulevard; thence easterly in said boulevard to the intersection of the center line of that part of the Grand Boulevard East running in a southerly direction; thence southerly along the center line of said Grand Boulevard East and the center line of McDougall Avenue and said center line extended in a southerly direction to the National Boundary Line, thence westerly along the National Boundary Line to the place of beginning.

Also all that portion of the City bounded on the north by the center line of Grand River Avenue, on the east by the center line of Woodward Avenue, on the south by the center line of Michigan Avenue, and on the west by the center line of the West Grand Boulevard.

AN ORDINANCE changing the name of Diana Avenue to West Chicago Avenue and Nardin Avenue to West Chicago Avenue.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT:

Section 1. That the names of the streets and highways known as Diana Avenue from Grand River Avenue to Nardin Avenue, and Nardin Avenue from Grand River Avenue to the northeasterly line of Lot 395 Nardin Park Subdivision, be and the same are hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known as West Chicago Avenue.

COMMON COUNCIL

(Official)

Detroit, Tuesday, Sept. 13, 1927.

The Council met and was called to order by the President, Hon. John C. Nagel.

Present: Councilmen Bradley, Callahan, Castator, Dingeman, Ewald, Littlefield, Stevenson and the President—3.

There being a quorum present, the Council was declared to be in session.

The Journal of the preceding session was approved.

Taken From the Table

Councilman Castator moved to take from the table an Ordinance changing the names of Francisco, Granville, Jarvis, Mackie, Newell, Strathmore and 2 strips of land, laid on the table September 6, 1927, (J. C. C. p. 2540), which motion prevailed.

The ordinance was then placed on the order of third reading.

Third Reading of Ordinance

The title to the ordinance was read a third time.

The ordinance was then read.

The question being "Shall this ordinance now pass?" The ordinance was passed, a majority of the Councilmen present voting therefor as follows:

Yeas—Councilmen Bradley, Callahan, Castator, Dingeman, Ewald, Littlefield, Stevenson and the President—8.

Nays—None.

The title to ordinance was confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS

From the Mayor

September 13, 1927.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:

Gentlemen—On July 13 of this year I returned to your Honorable Body without my approval, the resolution providing for the immediate filing of condemnation proceedings in connection with the proposed widening of Woodward Avenue. Following the receipt of this message your Honorable Body reconsidered your action and on July 20 I met with your committee-of-the-Whole in the Council Chamber. At this meeting the understanding was that a definite street widening program was to be adopted with the view to determining the order in which necessary street widenings were to be taken to court. Your committee-of-the-whole agreed to defer formal action until a decision would be made by the then president of the Common Council who was out of the city.

I am writing you at this time requesting again immediate action by your Honorable Body upon this question. At this time the Recorder's Court is in process of impanelling a jury upon the question of condemning for park purposes the property in the neighborhood of Belle Isle bridge. On the docket set for September 14 are the cases involving the widening of Gratiot Avenue between Pennsylvania and Connors Avenues and the widening of Davison Avenue. Ready for trial in the early Fall is the Livernois widening case. The Gratiot and Livernois cases have already been in court and the Gratiot case is a retrial. In view of these facts, it seems clear that the City is committed to go ahead with these particular widenings.

However, the necessity still exists for an immediate decision upon the City's widening program. It is no longer possible for the officials to decline to make decisions upon these tremendous problems which involve the commitment of the City to many millions of dollars in obligations. I earnestly request immediate action by your Honorable Body.

To the Honorable, the Common Council:
