Further Resolved, That the Board of Assessors cause the amount of all taxes in dollars and cents, to be ratably assessed and to cause the assessment rolls to be prepared in accordance with the foregoing tax statement.

Further Resolved, That there be levied and collected by general tax the amount of said tax statement so approved for municipal purposes and by appropriate tax the amount approved for the Public School Fund and for the Public Library Fund.

Further Resolved, That this Body does hereby authorize the issue of bonds for the items enumerated in the foregoing bond statement for the purposes therein named for public improvements, by borrowing upon the faith and credit of the City and upon the best terms that can be made, such sums appearing in the foregoing bond statements as shall from time to time be deemed necessary and expedient, to be issued in lieu of raising such sums by taxation and to be in other respects issued as may hereafter be determined by action to that end hereafter taken by this Body, consistent herewith.

Whereas, a petition was filed by the Koenig Coal & Supply Company same being No. 8241, praying for the vacation of a portion of Pierce Street, also for the vacation of the North and South alley in the block East of the Grand Trunk Railway South of Scott Street and North of Esplanade Street, and

Whereas, after due consideration by the Common Council of the City of Detroit vacated said streets and alleys in accordance with the prayer of petitioner's petition (J. C. C. p. 1921-1925, 1927), and

Whereas, there was contained in said resolution certain provisions which appeared the following:

"Provided the petitioner bear the entire expense of re-locating or re-routing any public utility now installed in the said streets or alleys which it may be necessary to remove due to the closing of the same.

And Whereas, because of the widening of said streets and alleys it became necessary for the Detroit Gas Company, a public utility to expend the sum of \$72.20 in re-locating certain gas mains, and

Whereas, the said Detroit City Gas Company has repeatedly endeavored to obtain the amount so expended from the said Koenig Coal & Supply Company without result, therefore

Be It Resolved, that inasmuch as the said Koenig Coal & Supply Company has not complied with the provisions as set forth in said resolution of the Common Council of the City of Detroit for the vacation of said streets and alleys, that said resolution as adopted by the said Common Council under date of July 5, 1927 (J. C. C. p. 1921) be and the same be hereby rescinded.
